Lecture 16: New Testament Survey

Roman Citizenship

In ancient Rome, Roman citizenship held a place of utmost significance, being a union of legal, political, and social privileges. Roman citizens were granted not only the right to a fair judicial process, but were also exempted from certain punishments. They could not be condemned without cause; rather, they possessed the right to a proper hearing in a court of law. Furthermore, they could appeal against judicial decisions. Roman citizens were generally spared from scourging, nor were they crucified. For this very reason, the blessed Apostle Paul was executed by the sword.

Citizens possessed the right to vote, to hold public office, and to access the benefits of the state. Moreover, they could own property and were exempt from local taxation.

6. Witnesses

The word *witness* is employed eleven times within the Book of Acts. The early believers were called witnesses of the Lord Jesus Christ (Acts 1:8). The term *witness* points to the responsibility of the disciples to testify of what they had seen and heard.

For this, the Greek word *martyrs* is used, from which the English word *martyr* is derived. A martyr is one who lays down his life for the sake of his faith and confession. It is to be remembered that the word *martyr* springs forth from the word *witness*; yet within the very idea of witness lies the seed of sacrifice and death.
